Note from the Executive Director

With 15 years of experience in child rights: capacity building, research, direct field intervention and advocacy, Child Rights Trust is rooted quite strong in the field. The dedicated team under the leadership of strong Trustees we are going ahead with new ideas and programmes to uphold every right for every child.

The biggest achievement of the year is organising the Regional Legislators' Conference on Child Rights along with UNICEF and the Karnataka Legislature in Sept. 2017 on issues related to Child Rights and SDGs. The event which was first of its kind has been appreciated by all concerned and we hope the legislators from all other states would take the queue and conduct similar exercises.

Sustainable Menstrual Hygiene Management (SMHM) is a new area that we have entered into along with RIM – Rejuvenate India Movement in Shidlaghatta block, Chikkaballapura where we are also working with schools with the support of ILP – India Literacy Project. This is a new area and we are learning about the issue that is connected to health, hygiene, environment protection, education and dignity of the girls.

We were part of the nation-wide study of Child Care Institutions (CCI) initiated by NCPCR and ChildLine India Foundation as per the court order. We could complete study in 10 districts of Karnataka and the experience is a wealth of knowledge to be used for upholding the rights of children in all places.

From the beginning of 2018 we have entered in to a new partnership with TdH NL to combat child marriages through a consortium of six organisations. IMAGE -Initiatives for Married Adolescent Girls Empowerment is an advocacy programme to work with married adolescents and their by tackling the menace of child marriages. This is a new strategy and we are curiously looking forward for greater experiences and learnings to end child marriages.

The 'Child Rights Circle' discussion that we initiated last year is getting its attention and we hope that this process will reach a new height. We are working on finding a new method to reach the districts to empower people with knowledge on various dimensions of child rights.

We thank all our supporters and donors for trusting us and our mission and letting us continuously indulge ourselves in this ever-widening area of child rights! In the coming years CRT would be working towards understanding child rights from NPC, National Plan of Action for Childre. We will continue to work on SDGs perspective and localising the issues to reach out to masses.

Our Projects and Activities

Karnataka Child Rights Observatory

The consortium [KCRO] that was launched in 2008, with CRT as the secretariat, an advocacy forum for the advancement of child rights in Karnataka. KCRO is run by a consortium of NGOs, academics and individuals working in the field. It was set up as an omnibus project with a number of sub-projects that together converge to provide Evidence based advocacy, working with key stakeholders and working with media followed by consultations, daily news digest, work with legislators, election advocacy, data compilations and presentations for the Alternative CRC review, and other issues.

Divisional Level Consultation on SDGS and children

Collaborated with network organisation in 4 divisions of the state: Reach, Anthyodaya & Dhvani in Belagavi Division, UNICEF district child protection scheme, Koppal in Kalaburugi Division, Social Work Dept, Tumkur University, Tumkur in Bengaluru Division and ODP in Mysore Division. The consultation dealt about SDGs and its relationship with MDGs, the challenges in achieving the Goals, need for internalizing SDGs for adopting, monitoring and reporting, Localizing SDGs and enhancing participation of Government representatives in achieving sustainable goals. This is the first of its kind information sharing about SDGs in the state and for the purpose KCRO produced a primer on SDGs in Kannada and English with relevant data information with a comparative analysis from southern states on the status of children. There is a need to reprint the primer to reach all the development activists.

SDGs: Stock taking process on situation of children

To get an understanding about the status of children from SDG perspective, KCRO members conducted a study in select areas (2 in villages and one in town/city in every district) in all the 30 districts of the state. The areas concerning to health services, child development including pre-primary services and primary education, child protection issues were studied using secondary data from various sources including district level officials., interview schedule, field visits and FDGs (Focussed Group Discussions). Detailed reports are available with the insights about the study. The experience has given sufficient information for the Observatory to take further capacity building and advocacy activities in the coming days both at state and local level to uphold the rights of the children.

A special primer on understanding SDG for children in Kannada is produced. The book is being distributed among children while conducting sensitising programmes on the issue.

NPC 2013: Divisional Level Consultation

The Government has adopted the National Policy for Children (NPC), 2013. It recognizes that a multisectoral and multidimensional approach is necessary to secure the rights of children. The Policy has identified four key priority areas: survival, health and nutrition; education and development; protection and participation, for focused attention. As children's needs are multi-sectoral, interconnected and require collective action, the Policy calls for purposeful convergence and coordination across different sectors and levels of governance.

The first review on NPC after adaptation of the policy is slated in 2018 as per the directions stipulated in the NPC itself. In this background KCR organized divisional level consultations on NPC in collaboration with various universities, Govt departments and NGOs to spread awareness about NPC and the review of the same. Students, teachers, research students from Dept of Social Work, Sociology, Women Studies, Media and Rural Development along with NGO representatives and Govt officials from specifically DWCD (Dept of Women and Child Development); Social Welfare and Health took part in the discussion in all the four consultations held.

The consultations included an introduction to NPC; situation of children, need for a policy, definition of policy, link between policy and constitution, ways and means of implementing the policy through legislative and administration actions, and how it is binding on all of us and finally the role of various stakeholders in reviewing the NPC in the coming years.

State Level Consultation on NPC

A state level consultation to discuss revisions required to the National Policy for Children was held on 23-24, November 2017 at ISI, Bengaluru. Representatives from various districts and universities from the state were present. In the consultation it was found that NPC is still an unknown document to most of the stakeholders and there is a requirement to publicise and popularise the same to reach everyone concerned. It was also felt that review of the NPC is now possible by a handful of people who are working on the rights of the children and the involvement of the Govt is much needed in the process.

Karnataka State Legislators' Forum for Child Rights

KCRO introduced a novel initiative 'Legislators Forum for Child Rights', first of its kind in the country. The Forum meets before assembly discussions commence and decides on issues relating to children that need to be debated and focused on in the assembly. The Forum members met the the Country Representative, UNICEF India at the Vidhana Soudha (4th July 2017) and shared common interests in child development and protection. The UNICEF country representative appreciated the efforts of the Forum members and said that it is a model to the country to uphold the rights of the children.

In an attempt to create a network of child friendly legislators, Karnataka Legislature under the leadership of Mr. DS Shankaramurthy, Hon'ble Chairman of the Karnataka State Legislative Council organised a Legislators Regional Conference on Child Rights (14th Sept 2017) with specific focus on SDGs and children. The Conference gave a good opportunity for the legislators who came from six states (Telangana, Andhra Pradesh, Goa, Maharashtra, Pudichery and Karnataka) to share the experiences in upholding the rights of the children. There were input sessions from experts on understanding SDGs and status of children in the light of meeting the needs of the children within a time frame. The conference called upon developing a plan of action in their respective states for children and also conducting review of the plans periodically.

With the initiatives taken by the Forum and the Chairman of the Council a Special Session on Child Rights was held in the month of July. This was the second such special session conducted by the Council in the last three years (the first was held in 2015). The whole discussion has set a new way of child rights advocacy with the legislators and the government.

Are There Children in Vidhana Soudha: An Analysis of 2016-17

KCRO continued to take up analysis of the question hour of the Karnataka Legislative Assembly and Council to elicit and examine what kind of child centric issues were discussed by the legislators. This is part of the monitoring of the commitments of the legislators towards upholding rights of the children through legislative process. During 2016-17, 43 days of sessions were held in both the houses (Karnataka Legislative Assembly and Council). The current analysis has taken into account questions raised during July 2016 to November 2017. The question hour in the legislative assembly saw a total of 9,519 questions of which 377 were child centered questions. The question hour in the legislative Council saw a total of 6,447 questions raised against all departments of the Government of which 428 were child centered questions.

The KCRO network is not only analysing the questions and answers but also providing information to the legislators on issues to be discussed on the floor of the house on various child rights centric issues. During 2017-18 KCRO has provided around 200 issues to the legislators and most of them have been raised by the Forum members.

Child in News

Since 2008 as part of social watch on child rights issues, KCRO is monitoring news reporting about children and child rights issues. Child in news is a continuing listing of reports, articles, editorials, features from 10 daily newspapers published from Bengaluru for child centered news, listing and disseminating to news users for advocacy, policy, campaign, education, research, further dissemination, etc.

Media Analysis and scanning of media reports on violation of child rights and initiation of corrective actions by the concerned authorities; highlighting reports on best practices and case studies on good developments. Karnataka Child Rights Observatory sends a email news bulletin to the stake holders to highlight the situation of children as reported in various print media. The emails are reaching NGOs, legislators, support agencies, media houses, and academic institutions and other interested groups and individuals and getting good response from them and it helps them to keep themselves updated. Trainers, facilitators, and people who conduct workshops also have regarded that a daily update equip them to use the

statistics, reports and some commentaries to bring relevance in their sessions. For more details visit: www.childinnews.blogspot.com

District & State Child Rights Parliament 2017

In an effort to promote child participation, Child Rights Parliament was initiated by KCRO in 2006. The whole process has strengthened the concept of informed Child Participation. Every year around 1500 children take part in the process from all the 30 districts of the state. In the recent developments NGOs, District Child Protection Units, Education Department and CBOs are taking interest in organising the CRP. The CRP has two parts. One to provide information on child rights, NPC and the status of children (statistical and case studies) in the state along with the performance of their respective MLAs in the Assembly and the second part is to get opinion and issues from the children to be discussed at district and state level to set right them. The process raises a lot of questions about child survival, protection, development and participation. The issues raised at district level are brought to Bengaluru to be consolidated and discussed with the Govt representatives.

District CRPs were held in 21 districts of the state & Child representatives from 26 districts took part in State CRP 2017 and the it was on 26-28, November at ISI, Bengaluru and in the Banquet Hall, Vidhana Soudha, Bengaluru. 70 children and 40 adults took part in the state meet and had discussions with legislators and the Chairman of the Legislative Council. A detailed report is available.

RTE TaskForce

The RTE Task Force movement was initiated as a response to the crisis situation erupted as a result of confusions created at the time of RTE Act implementation in the year 2011. Prior to this, i.e., immediately the Act was passed CRT and its network organizations were active in pressing the Government to pass the RTE Model Rules and was lobbying with the Karnataka Government for developing and implementation of the RTE Karnataka Rules. CRT team members were also members in the review committee of the draft Rules with the Govt. Currently the RTE Task Force as a project is working as an advocacy and resource group on RTE issues in Karnataka. It is catering to the support needs of NGOs, local networks, schools, Govt., and individual parents who require information and clarifications on various issues related to RTE implementation. The RTE Task Force is assisting by giving explanations on RTE Act, state rules and the various circulars issued by the Govt. from time to time.

RTE TaskForce is a basic source of information to several aggrieved parties in the state particularly on the Article 12.1.c of the Act which mandates 25% reservation of seats in non govt run educational institutions to children from socially and economically weaker sections. It is well known that after the admission to schools under this particular provision, most schools start demanding for enhanced or additional fees from the parents. RTE TaskForce is continuously working towards guarding the interests of these parents and children. Primarily the TaskForce is working towards taking the provisions of RTE act in totality.

RTE DAY 31st March
Bengaluru, Chikkaballapura, Gadag

We have initiated observing RTE Day in Karnataka on every April 1st, the day on which the RTE Act came in to force in 2010. RTE TaskForce celebrated this day in Bengaluru, Gadag and Chikkaballapura along with several other organisations all over the state. Selected SDMC member, teacher and head masters were honoured for appropriate understanding of the Act and attempts to implement the same. RTE TaskForce had conducted a study on the RTE compliance in sample districts and the outcome was presented. It was found that there is still a misconception about the scope of the Act. Many still think that the RTE Act is only for the non Govt schools and Govt schools have nothing to do with it. Secondly the basic requirements in terms of classrooms, trained teachers, toilets, drinking water, labs, library, etc. are still on the papers. Although in most of the Govt schools SDMCs are formed the members lack knowledge about their roles and responsibilities. Non Govt schools have not taken care to form SMCs. Thus, there is still need for giving wide publicity to the Act and training to the school teachers, parents and Govt officials, NGOs on the provisions of the Act. A detailed report is available. The event received good media publicity.

New project intervention

The RTE TaskForce did a State level advocacy on RTE Act and child protection policy in 150 schools both in Chikkaballapura and Gadag district. The child protection policy-based initiative was well appreciated by teachers and education dept. The project also focused on advocacy in 10 Gram panchayats, intervention with 50 anganwadi centers and 50 schools. The RTE taskforce also conducted capacity building exercise to its team members on understanding the Child Protection Policy (CPP) from the perspective of the Govt of Karnataka's draft CPP. The main activity of this intervention was to establish CPP in 150 school both in Chikkaballapura and Gadag district. The TaskForce members and CRT team members travelled to several districts in the state as resource persons on behalf of Govt to conduct orientation on the need for child protection policy and the formation of the same.

Child Rights Clubs

Child Rights Clubs were established in 50 Schools in Chikkaballapura. With the participation of these children and villagers, RTE TaskForce conducted 10 Child Rights Grama Sabhas where in child centric issues were raised for implementing child protection, child development and taking care of child health. Child Protection Policy documents are developed in 10 schools. The experience was later shared with other schools to develop the CPP in all the schools in the Chikkaballapura, Shidlaghatta block. Along with this RTE TaskForce also made an effort to collect basic data on physical facilities and structures about 50 schools and Anganwadi centers in Shidlaghatta Taluk. The data was used to discuss with the authorities on building basic infrastructure like toilets, water supply, compound, gate, repairs in the rooms, etc. The data is also shared with the SDMCs to take up action internally.

EMPOWERMENT OF ADOLESCENT GIRL CHILDREN

SMHM – Sustainable Menstrual Hygiene Management

(New initiative with RIM)

In the current year in collaboration with RIM – Rejuvenate India Movement, CRT has taken up a new project entitled Sustainable Menstrual Hygiene Management (SMHM) to empower adolescent girl children. The project involves health and hygiene education, managing disorder or health issues during menses, need for construction and use of toilets, hand wash, using sanitary napkins and dispose of the same suitably (without harming the environment) and shifting to reusable cloth napkins, etc. This new project has generated a lot of curiosity

among the 10 village schools, teachers, students and the surrounding communities on the concept and the utility of the same. As the project started in the fag end of the financial year, we will be taking up more initiatives in the coming days.

The objectives of the project includes : Need Assessment and survey of Sanitation in schools and communities of selected location with focus on SMHM; Studying the absenteeism among adolescent girls due to reasons associated to menstrual health; Facilitating health awareness including orientation on menstrual hygiene, sanitation and hand wash; Promotion of life skills (self-awareness, personal hygiene, health and hygiene, WASH, Safe management of menstrual cycle) among adolescent girls in school, community; Orientation for girl children on right to education, importance and completion of the same (existence of schools, academic performances, attendance of children, protection issues related to children, construction of toilets (separate for boys and girls), clubs of children, ChildLine concept etc.); Empowering girl child through carrier guidance / orientation on vocational education with Govt. and private support (scholarship, sponsorship, etc.); Conducting and linking activities with “village health & nutrition day”; Advocating among GP and communities on health of children

ChildLine 1098 Nodal Organization

CRT has continued its responsibility of coordinating the ChildLine (Toll free Child Helpline Telephone no. 1098) activities in Bangalore as a City Nodal, by the ChildLine India Foundation a project under Ministry of Women and Children, GOI. As a nodal agency CRT has undertaken and organized many capacities building trainings and workshops and awareness programmes along with collaborative agencies to police, teachers, students, NGOs and media at various levels. ChildLine also gets involved in rescuing children from various working situations, from railway stations and bus stands and also those who are begging in the streets.

Team member visited courts as witness and rescue children these tasks basically demand fair knowledge about court proceedings and good communication skills. To enhance these qualities among team members workshop was organised with the help of experts in the subject.

As part of equipping its members in laws, rules and policies related to Children and ChildLine CRT organized three capacity building workshops for the team on Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act (CALPRA), Medical schemes and Documentation

ChildLine Se Dosthi Week - The week was celebrated to publicise and to create awareness on ChildLine, make public friends of ChildLine and persuade public to call 1098, whenever they come across child in need/ distress. It was conducted through Jatha, Puppet Show, Radio Drama's, discussions, mass awareness, press conference we tried to reach more friends in the city.

Anti-Child Marriage and Sexual and Reproductive Health Project (IMAGE-Initiatives for Married Adolescent Girls' Empowerment)

After one-year interval/break the project to combat child marriages began in 2018 under the new title – IMAGE – Initiatives for Married Adolescent Girls’ Empowerment. With the prior experience of understanding the issue and developing a network around the issue, the project intends to build the capacities of the network members on facilitating trainings and discussions with field team, married adolescent girls and the Govt. This involves working with six groups in five districts in the areas of research, leadership development, communications and interacting with media and Govt. The project took its initial steps only in the month of February and will go on for the next three years.

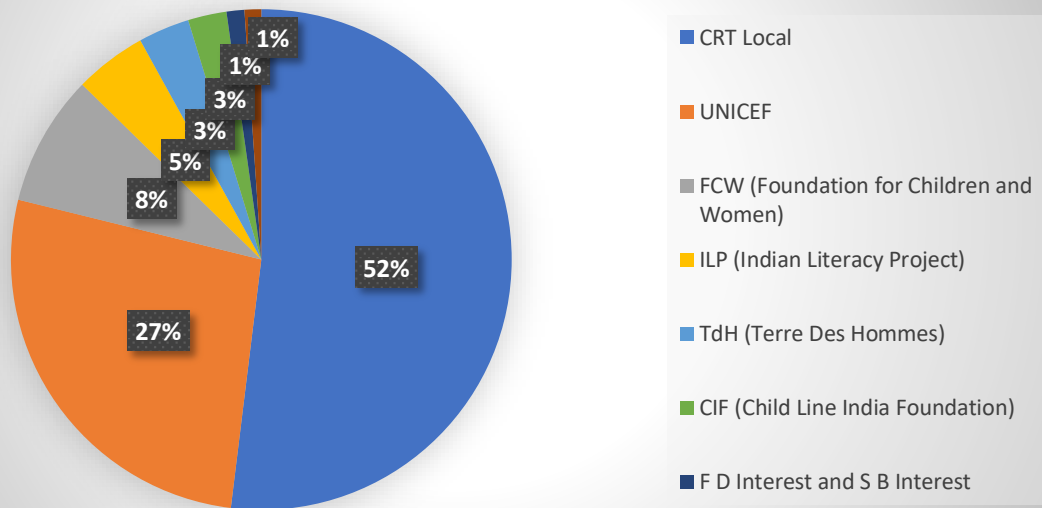
