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Reach and Impact So far

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Note from the Trustees

“Basic quality primary education is the right of every child,” said Mr S.V. Manjunath, emphasising this in his Dr Padmini Child Rights Memorial Lecture on 15th July 2025. “If we, as a State, community and families, fail to fulfil this opportunity for even a single child, it is a great injustice done to the entire children’s community. There are innumerable theories, methods, and intervention plans to reach out to every child, and there are enough resources with the Government, civil society, CSR, and philanthropists to cater to the educational and associated needs of every child. What is required is a concerted effort in reaching out to these children and to every deserving child.”

The aim of CRT, which originated from the thinking of our founder, Dr Padmini, is “Every Right for Every Child”. CRT is engaged in building the capacities of all concerned stakeholders in the children’s sphere on child rights, laws, rules, programmes, and intervention methods to reach out to every child, and in particular, children who are vulnerable and are victims of various kinds of violations. Our strong belief is that those who are working with children or intervening in various communities have to be equipped appropriately so that their interventions will be qualitatively better. CRT is organising or joining hands with other groups and institutions, both Government and non-government, and corporations too, to spread awareness about child-centric issues through trainings, workshops, programmes, research, and publications.

During 2025–26, CRT, along with its ongoing programmes – KCRO (Karnataka Child Rights Observatory) and Children in Governance, entered into a new partnership with Azim Premji Foundation titled Adolescents’ Collectives for Empowerment – ACE. This partnership is to develop adolescent collectives in six gram panchayats of Kurugodu Taluk, Ballari District. The programme commenced in January 2026. The Dr Padmini Child Rights Fellowship is now in its fifth year, and the Dr Padmini Child Rights Award has entered its fourth year. Our desire to expand the Fellowship is still in its nascent stage and requires sufficient support to encourage young professionals to dedicate themselves full-time to the field.

Towards the end of the year, CRT, along with CACL and ILP, organised a three-day Child Rights training at the Central University of Karnataka, Kalaburagi, in collaboration with the Department of Social Work. The programme was well received, with attendance of over 50 participants. We intend to take up more such programmes in the coming days.

The School Health and Wellness Programme, supported by UNICEF, is a very qualitative and timely programme that aims to reach out to more than 7,000 children in the State. Although the partnering teams are enthusiastic about reaching the maximum number of children, due to some administrative issues, schools are holding back on official agreements, citing a circular issued by the Education Department that tacitly instructs all educational institutions to keep NGOs away from schools. In spite of this, we have reached around 4,500 children so far. The programme is scheduled to reach 22,000 adolescents by 2027. This report is a brief account of the activities, learnings, and advances we are collectively making.

In 2026–27, CRT will concentrate on anchoring the ACE programme at Kurugodu, which is a new project, and also on the tasks with UNICEF through KCRO. We thank our Trustees and the team members for supporting the programmes and activities of the Trust.

Vision, Mission and Aim

Child Rights Trust [CRT] is a non-profit organisation involved in spreading child rights perspectives among all stakeholders. Initiated in August 2002, CRT has a goal to reach out to individuals and groups who are at the grassroots level working directly with vulnerable children, as well as administrators and policy makers at the highest level. Through research, training, advocacy and lobbying activities, CRT is empowering NGOs to be effective in their service provision from a child rights perspective and also in preparing vulnerable groups in both urban and rural areas to access the services due to them from the Govt. In its pursuit to uphold every right to every child, CRT is working with people's representatives and Governments from the grassroots to the national level using advocacy and lobbying techniques. We have been recognised with the Karnataka State Child Welfare Award in 2008.

- To secure the effective use of the legal process to remedy children's grievances

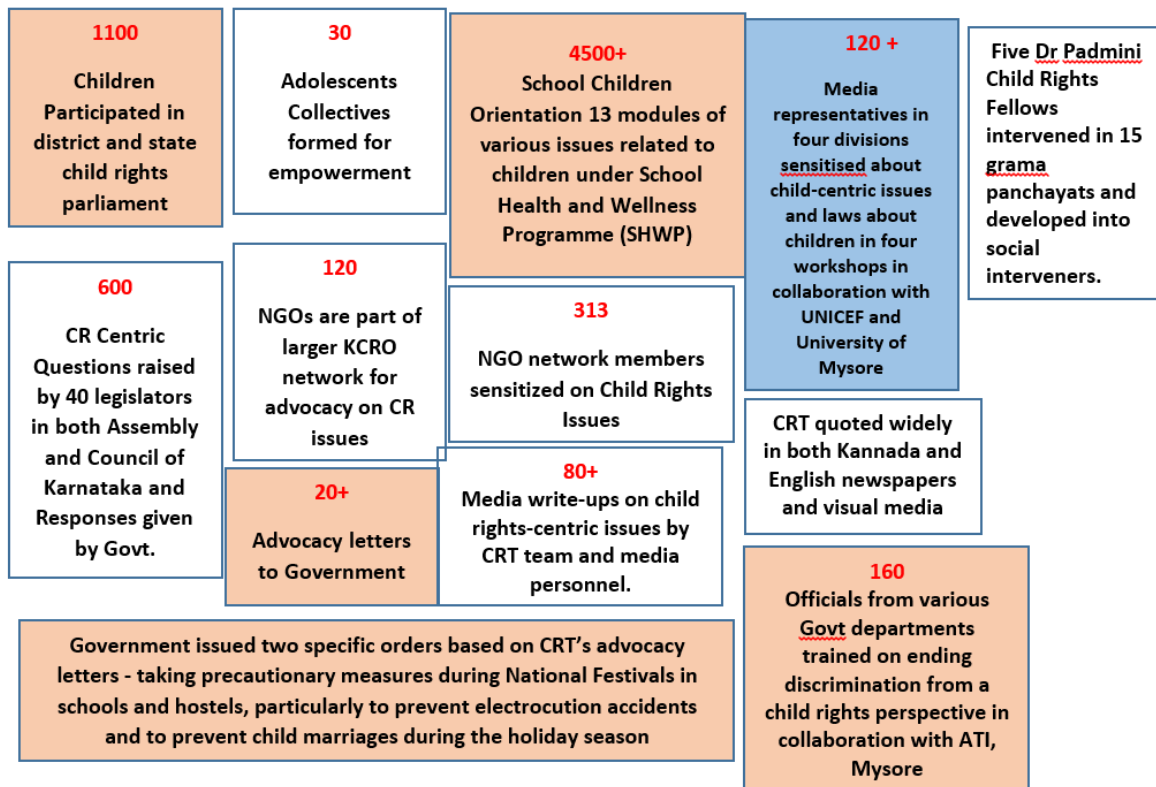

CRT 2025-26 Achievements



Cumulative Achievements

- Developed the concept of Child Rights Grama Sabha (CRGS) in 2006, which is now part of the RDPR system, in the Government of Karnataka. Every year, on average, one lakh fifty thousand children, and in the last 19 years, around 28.5+ lakh children have taken part in the CRGS held at Grama Panchayats of Karnataka and have experienced democratic processes at the grassroots level.
- Since 2008, in the district-level Child Rights Parliaments, every year about 1,500 children, on average, are taking part, and so far, more than 27,000+ children have taken part in the process.
- Around 1000+ child representatives have interacted with the legislators, ministers, and Chief Ministers in the State-level Child Rights Parliament held since 2008 and have raised child rights-centric issues, voicing the concerns from the grassroots experiences. The process has reached several policy and implementation issues to the highest level of decision-making and has resulted in some programs and projects.
- Facilitated with more than 120 legislators in Karnataka to form Karnataka Legislators' Forum for Child Rights since 2008 and reached out to more than 1100 child-centric issues to be raised on the floor of the Legislative Council and Assembly.
- Due to our regular interaction and advocacy with the Chairperson of the Legislative Council, a special session on Child Rights was conducted in 2014 and 2017.
- Organised South Regional Conference on Child Rights in collaboration with Karnataka State Legislators' Forum for Child Rights and UNICEF in 2017.
- Regular interactions with the media have resulted in wide news coverage and editorials on various child rights issues, drawing the attention of the Govt and public alike.

- Since 2003, conducted more than 715 training programmes on child rights-related topics in various parts of the state and the country and have reached out to 25,000+ personnel directly.
- In a collective effort, facilitated in preventing 700+ Child marriages, provided information and knowledge about PCMA 2006, rescued 1000+ children from labour situations while sensitising about CALPRA 1986, and prevented hundreds of girls from falling into the prohibited Devadasi system.
- Trained 1000+ members of District Child Welfare Committees and Juvenile Justice Boards in Karnataka on the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2000/2015, Child Rights and related statutes in protecting the interests of children.
- Adopted major child rights-centric Acts (JJ Act, PCMA, POCSO, RTE, CALPRA), UNCRC, SDGs and such material into Kannada and reached both children and adults.
- Facilitated in organizing 25 Rural Children's Libraries, reaching out to more than 2500 children
- Initiated a Children's Museum with artefacts from across the world with more than 300 pieces, which has been viewed and studied by more than 500 children.
- A daily news compilation and analysis of 'child in news' (CIN) is reaching out to 1000 + clients comprising NGOs, Govt officials, media, students, activists, etc.
- Advocated with the Education and Health departments to get a circular on display of ChildLine 1098 at school premises and in hospitals.
- Advocated with the Department of Labour to get a circular to support ChildLine 1098 and NGOs in rescue and case interventions.
- Coordinated providing relief measures to 10,000+ vulnerable families and children at Bengaluru, Chikkaballapura, Bellary and Dakshina Kannada during the COVID-19 pandemic
- For TLG India Private Limited, through a consultant, developed a Social Impact Assessment Course to track the implementation and impact of the Government Programmes across various departments.

1. Programme Highlights (2025-26)

A. **Karnataka Child Rights Observatory (KCRO)**, initiated in 2008, is a consortium of



NGOs and interested individuals to monitor the situation of children in Karnataka from the UNCRC perspective. Today, KCRO is also conducting various capacity-building programmes both online and offline, to equip NGOs to monitor the implementation of child rights-centred programmes and projects. KCRO works with groups of legislators from both the Assembly and the Council while raising child-centric issues through the Karnataka State Legislators' Forum for Child Rights.

During the year, KCRO, along with its support group and members, invested its time and resources in understanding the availability of food in schools and adolescents' eating habits in the state.

Highlights

1. **Meeting of Karnataka Legislators' Forum for Children - 17 July 2025**

Venue: Room No. 106, Vidhana Soudha

Participants: 14 Legislators and Ex-Legislators, including Hon'ble Speaker of UH.

Objectives: To enhance forum activities with old and new members of the forum and sharing of activities done by the forum since its inception in 2008 and activities to be taken by the forum in the coming years.



2. Launch of KCRO 2025-27 activities and Capacity Building programme on School Health and Wellness Programme (SHWP) 19-20, August 2025, Bengaluru.

Venue: ISI, Benson Town, Bengaluru

Participants: More than 40 participants across the state.

Objectives: To introduce the activities to be taken by the KCRO during 2025-27 and also capacity building on 11 modules of School Health and Wellness Programme. Mr. Zelalem Tefasse, Chief, UNICEF, Mr. Prosun Sen, UNICEF, and Capt. Ganesh Karnik presented in the programme.



3. Orientation of SHWP modules to adolescents in the districts - Ongoing



Venue: 5 schools of every district

Participants:

Adolescent Boys and Girls

Objectives: To provide age-appropriate information about health and nutrition to the children in schools; To promote healthy behaviors among the children

that they will inculcate for life; To promote safe menstrual hygiene practices by girls.

So far, more than 4500 adolescent boys and girls are covered under this programme. In 12 districts, this programme is completed for the year 2025-26, and in some districts it is ongoing.

State Child Rights Parliament

Held on 19-20 Nov 2025 at Vidhana Soudha and Vishranthi Nilayam

60 children and 30 adults participated.

Ms. Laxmi Hebbalkar, Hon'ble Minister of DWCD, interacted with the children. Mr. Shashidhar Gosumbe, Chairperson, KSCPCR, and members of KSCPCR were present on the occasion.



- **Assembly Q & H Analysis 2025:** An annual exercise conducted by KCRO to tabulate and analyse the child-centric questions raised in the Karnataka Legislative Assembly and Council and prepare a report '*Are there Children in Vidhana Soudha?*'. This is a popular social watch report referred to by the child-centric groups.

Total questions in Assembly = 6705; Child Centred questions = 406 (6.06%)

Total questions in Council = 4569; Child Centred questions = 182 (3.98%)

- **Child in News:** Scanning daily newspapers (10) for child-centred news, listing and disseminating to news users for advocacy, policy, campaign, education, research, further dissemination, etc. – since 2008. childinews2017@gmail.com

B. Adolescents' Collectives for Empowerment initiated in 2026 at Kurugodu Taluk of Bellary district with the following objectives:

- Protecting children from child marriage, child labour, physical and sexual abuse, online abuse and bullying, possible devadasi dedications, domestic violence, and trafficking and any other forms of violation of their rights
- Improving health conditions through healthy practices, hygiene, and understanding nutrition
- Orientation on life skills to adolescent girls and boys with a view on self and community development and leadership
- Enhancing educational levels through enrollment, retention, and academic support wherever necessary.
- Protecting children from child marriage, child labour, physical and sexual abuse, online abuse and bullying, possible devadasi dedications, domestic violence, and trafficking and any other forms of violation of their rights
- Improving health conditions through healthy practices, hygiene, and understanding nutrition
- Orientation on life skills to adolescent girls and boys with a view to self and community development and leadership
- Enhancing educational levels through enrollment, retention, and academic support wherever necessary.



Accomplishments as per the plans

1. Orientation on Project proposal, objectives, activities, documentation etc to the team members.
2. Project initiated in 6 Grama Panchayats of Kurugodu Taluk, Ballary district
3. 30 groups of adolescents (Boys and girls) initiated by March 2026

4. Interacted with the Government officials and, in particular, Grama Panchayats, Taluk Panchayats, Education, Health, and Police to initiate the intervention
5. Basic data collection about the children and the social situation underway for analysis
6. Celebrated Girl Child Day on January 24th in all six GPs with a total participation of 1000+ children, teachers, and GP functionaries.
7. Enrolled 12 children back to schools in various classes and has prevented 3 child marriages in its first quarter of intervention.

C. Children Getting Out of Devadasi (GOOD) System for further dedication,

concentrates on five north Karnataka districts to end the Devadasi System. CRT has been a consortium member since 2018 and is the knowledge partner, along with making advocacy efforts.

Child Rights Trust is the knowledge partner for IMAGE and C-GOOD projects. CRT facilitated capacity-building programmes for team members of both the IMAGE and C-GOOD projects, and for movement leaders, on leadership, advocacy, documentation, and understanding legal provisions, etc., who are spread out across 15 districts.

Accomplishments :

- **Advocacy on "Make Father's Name Optional":** Participated in a meeting with **Ms. Uma Mahadevan, Development Commissioner, Government of Karnataka**, at her invitation to discuss the campaign and formally submit the memorandum outlining the key demands.
- **District Field Visits and Capacity Building:** Undertook extensive district visits to gather first-hand information from the field and participated in district-level training programmes. Community and advocacy visits included interactions with **Sakhi Centres, Child Rights Club members, and parents** to strengthen child protection and community engagement initiatives.



- **State-Level Programme with Kishori Groups:** Facilitated sessions at a state-level programme for Kishori groups, focusing on communication skills, leadership, advocacy planning, and strengthening adolescent girls' participation in social change initiatives.
- **Paralegal Volunteer (PLV) Training:** Conducted capacity-building programmes for Paralegal Volunteers (PLVs) across **Ballari, Vijayapura, Koppal, and Bagalkote** districts to enhance their knowledge and skills in supporting community-based legal awareness and child rights interventions.
- **Development of Resource Materials:** Developed primers and Information, Education and Communication (IEC) materials on **Mental Health and Wellbeing** for the IMAGE team to support awareness generation and programme implementation.

D. Capacity building programmes, fellowship, awards and publications

The core capacity of CRT is building capacities of the field functionaries. During the reporting period CRT conducted 15 programmes on child rights and related legal issues while collaborating with network NGOs, Universities and CBOs. CRT could reach out to around 1000+ participants that include students, NGO personnel, government officials, media representatives and teachers.

What is significantly seen is that although there is a great need for capacity building and training for the people working with children, there is very little financial support for the same. With depleting funds for investing in capacity building we can foresee a situation where work and interventions in the field of child rights would be a very difficult proposition.

In the month of March 2026, CRT, with the support of ILP - India Literacy Project, organised a three-day Training of Trainers (TOT) programme in collaboration with CACL-K; Department of Social Work, Central University, Kalburgi on child rights. 50 enthusiastic youngsters from across the state, along with 15 resource persons, participated in the programme. The programme was designed to cover all the four basic groups of child rights from the perspective of constitutional rights and UN Human Rights. The participants opined that they got a very good opportunity to understand the theoretical and practical aspects of realising the rights of children.



G. Dr. Padmini Child Rights Awards, fellowship and memorial lecture:

The **Dr. Padmini Child Rights Awards**, instituted in 2023 with the generous support of **FCW, USA**, continued in 2025 as a tribute to the enduring legacy of **Dr. Padmini (15 July 1933 – 1 November 2022)**, the founding Trustee of the organisation. Her lifelong commitment to child rights and social justice was commemorated on **15 July 2025** through the presentation of the awards, fellowship programme, and memorial lecture.

Dr. Padmini Child Rights Awardees:

The awards recognise outstanding grassroots child rights defenders whose dedicated efforts have brought meaningful and lasting changes in the lives of children. Nominations were gathered from across Karnataka, and a distinguished selection panel comprising eminent social workers and media professionals shortlisted and selected the awardees.

The Dr. Padmini Child Rights Awards 2025 were presented to:

1. Ms. Radha R., Bengaluru
2. Mr. Anandraj Deshappa Tavardar, Kalaburagi
3. Mr. Wishwa Winyas, Mysuru



Each awardee received a citation and a cash award of ₹10,000 in recognition of their exemplary contribution to promoting and protecting child rights.

Dr. Padmini Child Rights Fellowship Programme:

Building on the success of the inaugural fellowship programme, the 2025th year's batch of **Dr. Padmini Child Rights Fellows** was selected through a rigorous application and selection process. The fellowship aims to nurture emerging grassroots leaders by strengthening their knowledge, leadership, and advocacy skills in advancing child rights.

The fellowship provides a platform for young child rights practitioners to enhance their capacities and contribute more effectively to the protection and promotion of children's rights in their respective communities.



Dr. Padmini Memorial Lecture

The annual **Dr. Padmini Memorial Lecture** was delivered by **Mr. Manjunath S. V., Associate Director and Head – Kannada Initiatives, Azim Premji Foundation, Bengaluru**. The lecture reflected inclusive education and community engagement in creating a safe and enabling environment for every child. Mr. Manjunath brought before us several practical issues at rural, tribal and urban set up, where children and families face difficulties in getting access to education. He stressed that if we succeed in providing quality education to all, certainly the children will find interest in taking up education and thereby become catalysts in resolving social problems.



H. Students

As part of the knowledge-sharing exercises, CRT is providing space and time for students from various disciplines, including Social Work, Law, Management and Psychology. During the year, 19 students underwent field training at CRT.

h. Networking Activities:

CRT continues to be part of several networks that are taking roles in advocacy and lobbying on various issues related to children and child rights. It includes Campaign Against Child Labour (CACL-K), Campaign Against Child Marriages, RTE Forum and India Alliance for Child Rights (IACR). We have either taken part in or organised programmes in collaboration with these networks on child rights awareness and discourses on child-centric policies, laws and programmes, as well as capacity building programmes for new personnel who are entering the child rights field. CRT is also part of a few committees of the Government, including the Juvenile Justice State Selection Committee (for District Child Welfare Committees and District Juvenile Justice Boards); the State Committee to review the Juvenile Justice State Rules; and the Anti-Child Marriage Committee. These are very good opportunities to raise child-centric, practical, and field-based issues for discussion and influencing the policies and programmes.

CRT is an active member of BalSuraksha Collective, a new initiative by the ex-partners of ChildLine India Foundation to take up collective action towards upholding the rights of the children. CRT is also taking an active role with the State Legal Services Authority in its review, discussions, and planning for rescuing children from beggary, trafficking, and preventing child marriages. CRT team members have actively taken part in the discussions related to books and libraries for children, Early Childhood Care and Development, nutrition and health issues.

With the coordination of other organisations and groups, CRT is also supporting and taking part in managing a Rural Children's Library at Chagaleti, Bagaluru Road, near Bengaluru International Airport and a Children's Museum (with the artefacts donated by Dr. Padmini) at SPARSHA, Hesaraghatta.

Our continued relationship with the media - print and electronic - has helped in bringing up child-centric issues regularly (newspapers, magazines, radio and TV channels). We are taking part in giving bites, sharing information, and also taking part in panel discussions as well as writing articles and columns for children and adults alike. We are also supporting several educational institutions (largely MSW and law) while providing internship opportunities and also visiting the colleges to give orientation on child rights issues.

- Constituted an IC and CP Committee with external and internal members.
- Adhered to the UNICEF Child Safeguarding policy
- The committee conducted programmes to the new members of the team at Kurugodu and re-orientation to the members at the Bengaluru office.
